6. Governance, Leadership and Management

• To be a centre of excellence which imparts value based education to young students and empower them as full-fledged future citizens.

• To translate the vision into action by giving globally relevant quality education to students irrespective of caste, creed and gender.

6.2Does the Institution has a management Information System

The college ensures a system of participative management whereby information flow and decision making process are systemised.

6.3Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The college was affiliated to the University of Kerala. Curriculum Development and revision is solely done by the University in the case of affiliated colleges. However our faculty members are influential in the Curriculum Development and revision being the members of various University Boards and Committees.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

The college followed innovative teaching learning methods. Method of teaching was purely student centric. The quality of Teaching-learning was improved by the use of ICT enabled class rooms. Feedback system ensures the proper quality in teaching —learning process. Remedial programmes and special support programmes were also given.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

The evaluation process consists of Continuous Assessment (CA) and End Semester Examination (ESE). Continuous Assessment (CA) consists of attendance, assignments, seminars and one internal examination per semester. Apart from internal examination class tests were conducted to measure the performance of the students at regular intervals. After the publication of the results of the University end semester examination (ESE), each department prepare the statement of result analysis which is presented before the College Council meeting.

6.3.4 Research and Development

The College has a research committee. The committee motivates the faculty and students to undertake research activities. The committee provides all information about the research areas, leading research institutes, available financial assistance and funding bodies, supportive institutions, etc.Details regarding minor and major research projects and postdoctoral fellowships were intimated timely.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

The ICT facilities and other learning resources are adequately available in the institution for academic and administration purpose. The library was completely computerised. At present it has attained the position of a first grade library with more than 25000 books and about 250 CDs. The library is automated using LIBSOFT, a well-known library management software. This is user friendly software in the digital era. It provides quick search and access, OPAC facility etc.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

Faculties participated in orientation and refresher courses conducted by various universities for improving the quality of teaching-learning process. Non-teaching staff got hands-on training on GAIN-PF. Teaching faculty is motivated to attend various training programmes and workshops to keep up to-date with academic developments. Teachers undertake additional charge of extra and co-curricular activities and they get an opportunity to develop leadership qualities.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

The teaching and non-teaching staffs were recruited according to the Government and University Rules and Regulations. Selection of Guest Faculty was done on merit basis by the college itself.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

Several departments associate with nearby research institutions for the conduct of UG and PG research projects. Department of Botany keeps informal linkage with Jawaharlal Nehru Tropical Botanic Garden and Research Institute, Palode.

6.3.9 Admission of Students

Online admission was conducted through the online admission portal of Kerala University as per the university schedule. The admission processes to be performed at the college level is monitored by the Admission Committee. Government rules were strictly followed for preparing the rank list of community seats. All reservation policies of the Government were strictly followed.

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Strengths

The college has a great ambience as it is situated in the greenery provided by the backdrop of the Western Ghats. The atmosphere of the college is serene, devoid of the dust, pollution and the sophistication of the city. The college is still unaffected and unpolluted by the pomp and vices of the city life. This provides the college a favourable teaching and learning atmosphere. The college also possess a dedicated team of faculty supported by an equally dedicated team of office staff who lend support to the principal and college administration in maintaining the driving principle of discipline and quality. Well furnished and equipped labs including language lab ICT aided teaching learning process, Internet connections in the various departments and the college library, minor research programmes pursuing teachers and researchers strengthens the teaching, learning and research process. The faculty and staff indulge .The faculty and college staff gives utmost importance to the student to student development by giving the individual care by different units, programmes, counselling and mentoring.

Weakness

Most of the students are from financially and educationally backward families. The learning atmosphere and competence of the schools from which the students are hailing are affected by this backwardness and challenges. More PG courses are required in the college as the students who wish to pursue their studies can move forward if otherwise they drop studies after completing graduation.

Opportunities

Students are provided with extremely favourable learning atmosphere. They are well trained to face the challenges of life as many of them, coming from poor families have seen and faced hard realities of life. The available PG courses, research centre, ASAP Programmes provide them with great opportunities without the support of the facilities that a college from the city can provide. The students are given ample encouragement by the college PTA and the college alumni in their studies and future pursuits by giving them timely training and cash prizes for their achievements.

Challenges

The lack of proper training and fluency in the use of English language pose a great difficulty in the teaching and learning atmosphere of the college. The girl students however good they are in the studies get married before the completion of their graduation. This badly affects the pass percentage of the college. The bad family conditions urge the male students to quit college and seek career even at an early stage in their lives. The drop out ratio thus affects the academic performance of the college but the faculty and staff of the college is working for improving the situation.

FEED BACK ANALYSIS 2016-17

Questionnaire consists of 20 parameters were given randomly to 100 students of the whole college at the end of academic year by IQAC team. Feedback from students were collected and evaluated. The responses for the questionnaire were consolidated. A summary is given below:

- ✓ Students have the opinion that there is no gender discrimination.
- ✓ Teachers help the students in facing physical, emotional and learning challenges.

Best Practices

Best Practice – 1

Title: Walk With the Scholar (WWS) Programme

Goal: To train, motivate and guide academically brilliant students to aspire high in life.

The Practice and its Impact:

Walk With the Scholar (WWS) Programme, a new initiative of the Higher Education Department, Government of Kerala, was turned into a real experience in Iqbal College under the Co-ordinatorship of Mr. Anas, Assistant Professor in Politics. Framed to provide specialized mentoring programmes for Under Graduate students in Arts, Science and Commerce, WWS scheme introduced the concept of mentor as a 'Guide' and 'Friend'.

Selected mentors from different departments of the college succeeded in giving necessary orientation to groups of not less than 30 academically brilliant and genuinely interested students every year since 2015. The mentor happily engaged these students in multiple tasks like self introduction, interviews, book and film reviews, presentations followed by group discussions on study reports of diverse socially relevant issues etc. which helped them to boost their self-confidence and communication skills. To enhance the effect of this mentoring venture, a motivational visit was conducted to the universities and other reputed institutions of Chennai and Pondicherry in March 2016, followed by another one to Hyderabad in March 2017. In addition to this internal mentoring, efficient external mentoring sessions were also provided which helped the students to identify their strengths and weakness, rectify the faults and evolve into the person they want to.

After each hour of mentoring, the mentees were able to see in themselves a change in their attitudes and aspirations. And likewise they began to shape their academic and personal life to higher goals. The motivational visits gave the students a chance to interact with the students of these institutions. This in turn stimulated our students to come out of their nutshell and aspire for higher education in similar universities. **WWS helped the students to identify their real self – who they are, what they want and what they can do.**

Best Practice – 2

Title: Scholar Support Programme (SSP)

Goal: To provide personalised and additional support to academically weak students.

The Practice and its Impact:

The SSP is a part of the "New Initiatives of Higher Education', Department of Higher Education, Govt. Of Kerala and it aimed at imparting additional support to students in curricular areas of weakness. Based on a result analysis, six difficult subjects were identified and based on the marks of the qualifying examination, around 30-40 weak students were identified for the SSP every year. Additional curricular supports were provided to this batch in the form of additional lectures, extra reading materials, question banks, etc. The resource persons who handled the concerned subjects were also entitled the task of generating interest in students in the concerned subjects. And a minimum of 10 classes are given to these students on each subject outside the regular college hours.

As a visible outcome of the SSP programme initiated in our college, the academically weak students were able to develop an interest in their weak subjects and thereby give extra time for its study. And this helped them to score in par with their batch mates in the University examination which followed these SSP classes.
